



The events of 13 and 14 November 2022, have left a lasting legacy on our Shire, our communities, and our environment.

The catastrophic event saw homes, businesses, livestock, rural properties, crops, machinery and infrastructure damaged, destroyed or lost across Cabonne. Most devastatingly, the flood event also resulted in the loss of two Cabonne residents.

The sheer scope of the floods means we are yet to fully realise the long-term impacts on the environment, the economy and the health and wellbeing of the community. The wellbeing and mental health challenges that will impact our community in coming months and years will be difficult to quantify and even harder to manage.

Whilst we have been supported by both the NSW and Federal Governments in the immediate clean-up and recovery efforts, our communities are going to require ongoing support for a number of years, but we want to ensure that this support helps us to build back better.

The Cabonne Recovery Plan 'Building Back a Better Cabonne', helps to identify the key elements required to rebuild and stimulate our local economy, as well as support efforts to secure additional investments in essential areas which underpin our recovery. It prioritises infrastructure restoration and the economic recovery of our towns and villages, while ensuring we keep sight of delivering the basics our community expects.

Council will continue to work with our impacted communities to understand their recovery needs. I want to thank all residents who have taken time to share their valuable inputs into this recovery plan. Ongoing engagement with our communities will continue as we support the recovery journey of Cabonne. I am so proud of the resilience and determination demonstrated by so many across Cabonne, and the way that our communities have worked to support each other.

We know there will be many challenges as we recover from the events of November 2022, however the Cabonne Recovery Plan is our opportunity to leave a positive legacy for the future. Together, we will build back a better Cabonne.

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The Cabonne Recovery Plan will outline the actions the community and Council are taking in response to the flood event and breaks down the estimated costs to repair critical infrastructure throughout Cabonne, as well as the cost to local homes, businesses, the natural environment and the wellbeing of our communities.

The Cabonne Recovery Plan will help drive our direction to restore the Cabonne Local Government Area in partnership with Council, the community, disaster support agencies, and state and federal government.

The Plan also looks to the future with ideas to restart our regional economy and build back better, so our community is more resilient to future natural disasters.

Cabonne Council will continue to work with, and advocate on behalf of our communities to understand how to build the community's long-term resilience to disaster through improving community infrastructure and public assets to ensure our region is socially sustainable, now and in the future.

The Cabonne Recovery Plan will be a living document as conversations continue with our communities, and plans, projects, and priorities are detailed and adjusted.

About Cabonne

Cabonne is a rich rural shire in Central West NSW, made up of 11 towns, villages, and localities including: Borenore, Canowindra, Cargo, Cudal, Cumnock, Eugowra, Manildra, Molong, Mullion Creek, Nashdale and Yeoval.

Cabonne extends from Eugowra in the west, the site of Australia's biggest & most famous gold robbery at Escort Rock by Frank Gardiner, through to Ophir in the east, where Australia's first gold rush was. In the south is Canowindra, the ballooning Capital of Australia, a town full of historic pubs, antiques and wine, and to the north is the village of Yeoval, the childhood home of Banjo Paterson, one of Australia's most famous poets.

Australia's Food Basket produces a spectacular variety of foods including; dairy products, beef, lamb, venison, apples, berries, canola oil, wine, flour, eggs, honey and gourmet food products.

The Cabonne Local Government Area (LGA) occupies 6,023 square kilometres with our pristine environment home to some of the most beautiful and bountiful country in New South Wales, including the magnificent Mount Canobolas, Borenore Caves and three National Parks. Mount Canobolas is the highest point in the Shire at 1395m above sea level.

Climate adaptation and flood mitigation

The flood events of 13 and 14 November 2022 are widely accepted as being unprecedented across Cabonne.

Council has been acutely aware that it is widely acknowledged that the climate is changing, both globally and locally. It is important that the Cabonne Recovery Plan considers the impacts of a changing climate and identifies projects and initiatives that assist Council and the community to adapt to this changing climate.

Council has over recent years been working with the Cabonne Flood Plain Management Committee to appropriately address contemporary flood risks, as well as develop flood risk management plans across effected sections of the Shire.

Data from the 2014 Central West and Orana Climate Change Snapshot shows that, at a minimum, the Cabonne Local Government Area can expect increased risks related to both more intense rainfall and changes in seasonal rainfall patterns.

In the Central West and Orana the majority of models (9 out of 12) agree that spring rainfall will decrease in the near future and the far future (8 out of 12 models). The majority of models (10 out of 12) agree that autumn rainfall will increase in the near future and the far future (11 out of 12 models).

The greatest reduction in rainfall is projected around Parkes, Forbes and Cowra in spring. Autumn increases are relatively uniform across the region.

An increase in summer rainfall is projected for the far future (11 out of 12 models) but changes in the near future are less uniform with drier conditions in the north and wetter conditions in the south. Changes in winter rainfall are less clear with projected decreases in the near future (7 out of 12 models) and projected increases in the far future.

Seasonal rainfall projections for the near future and far future span both drying and wetting scenarios: in the near future the changes are: summer –15% to +16%, autumn –11% to +42%, winter –12% to +3%, and spring –25% to +11%; in the far future the projected range of changes are: summer –10% to +26%, autumn –9% to +45%, winter –25% to +34%, and spring –25% to +17%.

In March 2023, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change released data and analysis to indicate that the 2014 earlier predictions may indeed be optimistic, and the current risk posed may be even greater.



Climate adaptation and flood mitigation

Data from the Bureau of Meteorology's (BOM) State of the Climate Report 2022 highlighted that "observations, reconstructions of past climate and climate modelling continue to provide a consistent picture of ongoing, long-term climate change interacting with underlying natural variability. Associated changes in weather and climate extremes — such as extreme heat, heavy rainfall and coastal inundation, fire weather and drought — have a large impact on the health and wellbeing of our communities and ecosystems."

These changes are happening at an increased pace — the past decade has seen record-breaking extremes leading to natural disasters that are exacerbated by anthropogenic (human-caused) climate change. These changes have a growing impact on the lives and livelihoods of all Australians. Australia needs to plan for, and adapt to, the changing nature of climate risk now and in the decades ahead.

The BOM also notes that southern and eastern Australia - including the Cabonne LGA - is projected to experience a continued decrease, on average, in cool season rainfall, which will likely lead to more time in drought, but with ongoing climate variability that will give rise to short-duration heavy-rainfall events at a range of timescales.

Unfortunately, Council is yet to source recent localised predictions, however current analysis on the available data shows the changes to rainfall represent a very high risk which will result in more frequent and significant flood and stormwater events across the Shire.

The Cabonne Recovery Plan is by necessity a high-level strategic document to guide the community, Council and other levels of Government on the needs of the Local Government Area as we work to recover from the events of November 2022, to build back better, and to ensure our community is more resilient to future natural disasters.

It will be necessary to further develop a number of projects and initiatives to ensure adequate detail and scope are achieved to inform decision making and prioritisation.

Council is required to develop climate adaptation plans across all aspects of its operations. The Cabonne Recovery Plan will highlight a number of measures that are required as both a response to this disaster, and simultaneously as a response to the changing climate and the flood risk posed.

Council is already undertaking detailed flood and risk management studies and planning processes across its flood-prone catchments. Council is also at the initial stages of developing climate adaptation plans in relation to its infrastructure and operations.



Throughout the Cabonne Recovery Plan the projects and activities that relate more pointedly to climate adaptation and flood mitigation, as identified by the community and Council, are identified using the following icon:



Many of the climate adaptation and flood mitigation projects and activities identified in the Recovery Plan use the words flood-resilient and betterment. Council is seeking these improvements not to "gold-plate" high-risk infrastructure, but to ensure it is future proof.

These projects and activities will be further developed and refined, with a number of supporting documents to be developed by Council including:

- Flood Risk Management Plans
- Climate Adaptation Plan
- Disaster Recovery Action Plans.

Whilst it is somewhat subjective what projects and activities are a direct response to climate adaptation and/or flood mitigation, an example of the difference between a recovery project that is not a direct response to this category but is still vitally important in restoring our communities is:

"Restore the visitor economy".

Whereas the following recovery project is a direct response to damage caused by climatic factors:

"Rebuild Nyrang Creek Bridge between Canowindra and Eugowra to better resist future flooding."

Understanding the potential intensification of extreme rainfall in a warming climate is important to inform the continued safe operation and prioritisation in seeking betterment of Council's high-risk infrastructure.



Central to the Cabonne Recovery Plan is understanding of the community priority projects of the five flood-affected townships of Canowindra, Cudal, Eugowra, Manildra, and Molong.

Spending time together discussing options and possibilities delivered an understanding of what matters most to each community, both now and into the future. It also provided another opportunity for Council and Community to be updated on what everyone has done and is continuing to do to ensure recovery leads to a better future for each township and the Shire overall.

Building Back a Better Cabonne - Recovery Plan, has benefitted from community input.

Engagement processes were held throughout April and May 2023 and included conversations, workshops, and a community survey.

Raising awareness of the engagement and informing the community about the plan and its purpose was supported by newsletters, media releases and social media. However, the most effective means of motivating people to contribute came from the determined leadership within each community, acting together with strong local networks.

The workshops focused on the following four themes of the Recovery Plan:

- Restore Community Infrastructure
- Environmental Restoration and Adaptation
- Support Communities to Recover
- Rebuild and Support Businesses and the Regional Economy.

Participants were asked to add any projects or initiatives they thought were missing from each theme. Once they had contributed these, they then identified their overall priorities from any of the four themes. Using three tokens of decreasing value, each participant selected their key priorities.

Token values were added up to produce a list of priorities for each township from the perspective of workshop participants.


Following the workshops, the Cabonne Recovery Survey was sent to every household in the five townships.

It also asked participants to state their three priorities within the four themes and provide thoughts on anything they thought was missing. Surveys were available online and in paper format.

Results were collated by firstly allocating each participant's comment to a theme and issue within the theme. The number of comments were then counted to indicate priorities.

The priorities from the workshops and surveys were then combined. They are shown in this plan's relevant town and village pages, as primary projects.

The greatest priority for each town is listed as the priority project.








Recovery Planning Framework

Under the Local Government Act 1993, all Councils in NSW are required use the Integrated Planning & Reporting framework to guide planning and reporting activities.






COMMUNITY STRATEGIC PLAN 2022-2032




DELIVERY PROGRAM 2022-2026

The Plan also looks to the future with plans to restart our regional economy and build back better, so our community is more resilient to future natural disasters.



2 PROJECT

Is the identified project or activity required to support recovery. Some projects and activities may require detailed design work to better attract government funding, for grant applications, the development of targeted action plans, advocacy proposals, and to support not-for-profit/community funding opportunities.

3 LOCATION

Whilst the flood predominately impacted Cudal, Canowindra, Eugowra, Manildra and Molong, there are some projects which will support the entire shire.

Specific town/village projects have also been identified.

COUNCIL'S ROLE: ADVOCACY & DELIVERY

AT A GLANCE

Cabonne Council manages a 1930km road network. It is vital that Council's roads, bridges. culverts and footpaths are maintained to support Cabonne's agriculture industry, encourage tourism, and ensure that all road users are able to travel safely.

Unfortunately, these transport links have been severely damaged by a number of consecutive flood events since 2021, which has placed significant strain on Council's annual repair program. Council is still assessing the full extent of the repairs required and expects that further damage will emerge in the post-flood period as saturated pavements begin to fail.

One of the major issues with the way disaster assistance funding is made available to Council's to assist in infrastructure rehabilitation, is that the funding only allows for like-for-like replacement of assets, rather than betterment, which would enable Council's to build climate-resilient infrastructure.

WHAT WILL COUNCIL DO?

While Council is undertaking repairs to our road and community infrastructure, Council also needs to continue with its existing grant-funded projects, so that we don't lose this funding for our community. We must also ensure that our regular inspection and maintenance programs are carried out, so we identify any emerging issues quickly.

The first step in the recovery process is to finalise the full damage assessment, including bridge inspections, and lodge applications for Disaster Funding Assistance with the NSW Government or through Council's insurer.

A top priority in the recovery period is to keep our key regional link roads and freight routes operational and improve their future flood resilience.

Other priorities include fixing up our damaged sporting and community facilities. Whilst some of these works are covered by our flood insurance, it will take time to complete the damage assessments, source the materials and complete the repairs. Council will work closely with user groups while this work is being carried out.

Council will also be focusing on our unsealed roads network, ensuring people have safe access to their properties and systematically repairing major damage as funds become available.

KEY COUNCIL PRIORITIES

Advocate for betterment funding to ensure that roads and community assets are climate-resilient.

Rebuild and repair damaged roads, bridges and culverts.

Restore and maintain community facilities and assets, including sporting facilities, parks, recreation areas, cemeteries, footpaths and cycleways.


Deliver quality water supply services.

Repair/rebuild sewage treatment plants and sewerage networks.

Advocate for government assistance to support community groups with further grants for sporting clubs who have lost equipment or facilities.

Continue to deliver maintenance contracts for State and Regional Roads.

Review 2023-24 Capital Works **Program** to prioritise flood damage repairs.



AT A GLANCE

Cabonne's economy has been underpinned by a long-established, strong and vibrant agricultural sector, as well as a growing professional services and tourism sectors.

Up to 100 commercial and industrial businesses across the Cabonne LGA were impacted by the flooding events of November 2022. These businesses are predominately small and micro businesses.

Many of these businesses were already under pressure from the 2019 drought and bushfires, previous flooding events and the COVID pandemic.

The 2022 floods delivered another major blow.

3. Building Back A Better Environment

COUNCIL'S ROLE: ADVOCACY, FACILITATION & DELIVERY

AT A GLANCE

Cabonne has experienced a number of recent natural disasters – each with devastating impacts for our community.

Our climate is changing, and we need to be prepared for life in a more challenging environment in the coming years.

The 2022 flood was one of the worst natural disasters our community has experienced. We want to do everything we can to avoid or reduce the impacts of these events in future. While we can't avoid extreme weather events, we can improve the way our assets are designed and invest in building flood-resilience in high-risk areas.

The recovery process for the natural environment will also take a long time. The November flood event - following years of drought - has ripped through riverbanks and destroyed large areas of vital habitats.

WHAT WILL COUNCIL DO?

Restoring the health of the river will take many years and a targeted clean-up, monitoring and restoration program will be required.

Council will be working closely with the EPA, Crown Lands, Local Land Services (LLS) and other agencies to help improve water quality in our river, to protect our town's drinking water supply, restore habitat and ensure it is safe to swim and fish in the waterways.

We'll also be working with the EPA to help manage pollution risks through damaged fuel tanks and chemical spills that occurred during the floods. Damaged septic tanks and other on-site sewage treatment systems will also need some attention and Council will be undertaking an inspection and improvement program for high-risk sites.

Council will work with LLS to help prevent weed infestation from all the material carried down the river and onto our farmlands.

We'll also be looking to build our community's longterm resilience to disaster by improving water security for our region, so we are better prepared for future droughts and bushfire.

KEY COUNCIL PRIORITIES

Seek funding to complete and improve long-term flood planning and risk management.

Work with EPA to monitor and remediate contaminated lands in flood-affected areas.

Improve community preparedness and capacity to respond to natural disasters.

Explore alternative waste management options.



Our communities have lost many things in these catastrophic floods – our homes, jobs, regional centres and services and community facilities - but what has survived, despite these challenges, is the strong connection that people have to this special place and the community ties that hold us together.

WHAT WILL COUNCIL DO?

Providing clear, accountable leadership will be essential in supporting our community through the recovery process over the coming years.

Although the flood response will be front and centre for the next few years, Council still needs to continue the day-to-day services that our community relies upon. Public facilities must be cleaned, main streets, parks, sports grounds and cemeteries well maintained, and all the regulatory services Council provides – such as rangers, environmental health, development assessment and building inspections will still go on.

Council will be working with our communities to understand how to build long-term resilience to disaster through improving both local infrastructure and public assets, as well as advocating and facilitating programs to enhance community social fabric, and to ensure our region is socially sustainable, now and into the future.

This will include advocating to other levels of government for community priorities - which will be a key focus over the next three years.

We will also continue to keep the community up to date through social media, Council's website, updates in local papers, livestreaming of council meetings, and working with community groups including progress associations, advisory groups, and other interest groups.

Support temporary housing options that keep people connected to their community.

Work with our community to lead local resilience and recovery programs.

Support funding applications to enable community groups and sports clubs to recover.

Advocate to federal and state governments for community needs and priorities - particularly around **housing needs**.

Ensure consistency and collaboration across the many agencies that are involved in flood recovery, so that the community receives **clear communication.**

Advocate for funding for **activation projects across Cabonne** – in line with Community Masterplans.

COUNCILS ROLE: DELIVERY

AT A GLANCE

Providing clear, accountable leadership will be essential in supporting our community through the recovery process over the coming years. Council expects it will take at least three years to get things back on track. But not everything will be the same as before.

The impact of the flood events have not only affected our communities but a significant number of Council assets and infrastructure have also had substantial damage. In planning for recovery council needs to restore essential community and council owned assets at the same time as supporting communities in their recovery.

WHAT WILL COUNCIL DO?

The capability and capacity of the workforce to deliver business as usual services and the expanded recovery programs to restore assets and infrastructure is a key challenge.

The recovery phase will extend over at least 3 years and the this will place enormous resourcing challenges for council. Like most industries in a post COVID-19 environment, attracting and retaining staff had already been difficult and this is now heightened.

Council will be impacted financially in both the short and long term and will need to be transparent and measured in the decisions that are made – balancing the understandable needs of community with the financial and staffing capability to deliver.

Engaging with our communities has always been a priority for Cabonne and is even more critical in the recovery phase.

Council will need to provide support, information and advocate on behalf of community to other government agencies to ensure an intergovernmental response – Council cannot do this alone.

Managing our resources responsibly will be a key focus for the next 3 years.







Measuring Success



It is important to monitor how our communities are progressing in 'Building Back a Better Cabonne'.

As part of the Cabonne Recovery Plan, Council will monitor and report on outcomes from the Recovery Plan. Council provides 6-month progress reports as part of Council's Operational Plan, which will outline Council's progress against the activities of the Recovery Plan. Indicators will be developed to measure progress in the recovery.

Council will measure outcomes in a number of ways including:

- Listening to community feedback through surveys, listening tours and other engagement activities
- Monitoring state and regional reports, including reports from the Recovery Taskforce and Regional NSW
- Measuring local trends in redevelopment, housing applications, productivity and employment
- Monitoring environmental health, such as water quality and habitat regeneration
- Comparing Council's financial performance against the NSW local government benchmarks
- Using Council's audit and risk management functions to assess organisational performance.

The projects and activities outlined in the Cabonne Recovery Plan are designed to enable the development of more detailed design, advocacy proposals and action plans. In consultation with key partners, Council and the community will be primarily responsible for the development of much of this.

In addition, as Council works to increase our maturity in development of flood management and climate adaption strategies the projects and activities outlined in the Cabonne Recovery Plan will be further developed and refined. A number of supporting plans and documents will be developed by Council including:

- Flood Risk Management Plans
- Climate Adaptation Plan
- · Disaster Recovery Action Plans.
