





## **Eugowra R4R - Mid Scale Solar**

## **Project value**

- \$5.5 m
- Approx. 4280 solar panels
- Covering 1.5 ha
- Design allows for a stage 2 of another 1.5 ha
- Will generate enough power to offset councils usage
- Sale of remaining being 50% to increase total return on investment
- Assist emissions and compliance expectations.









Council's finances are made up of different funding sources, each with specific rules about how the money can be used:

#### **Operational Funding (wages)**


This covers the day-to-day running of Council - things like staff wages, services, and maintenance. It comes from rates, fees, charges, and untied grants.

#### **Capital Funding (inheritance)**

This includes grants that are tied to specific projects or infrastructure, such as roads, buildings, or playgrounds. These funds can't be used for general operations or wages.

#### **Restricted Reserves (superannuation)**

These are funds set aside for specific purposes - either internally by Council or externally by the State Government. They can only be used with approval and for designated projects, not for everyday expenses.



# COST SHIFTING ONTO LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Despite growing responsibilities and community expectations, local government spending has not kept pace with state and federal governments.

#### **Key takeaways:**

#### Commonwealth Government (yellow line):

Shows the highest and fastest-growing per capita spending, with a noticeable spike around 2019–20, likely due to COVID-19 stimulus measures.

#### **State Government (maroon line):**

Also shows a steady increase in spending, but at a slower rate than the Commonwealth.


#### **Local Government (red line):**

Remains relatively flat, indicating that local councils' per capita spending has barely increased over the past 20 years.

## STATE AND FEDERAL GOVERNMENT GRANT FUNDING



- Since 2019, Council has successfully secured over \$14.8 million in NSW and Federal Government funding to deliver vital infrastructure and community projects across Cabonne.
- These programs have been instrumental in supporting everything from road upgrades and public amenities to community halls and recreational spaces.
- However, these funding streams have now been discontinued, leaving councils like ours, without access to critical financial support for future infrastructure needs.



## **COST SHIFTING**

- LGNSW shows cost shifting reached \$1.5 billion in 2023/24 up 10% from two years ago. That's around \$497 per ratepayer.
- For Cabonne Council, nearly two-thirds of the average residential rate now goes toward covering State-imposed costs instead of local infrastructure.





#### AVERAGE **RESIDENTIAL** ORDINARY RATES





#### **AVERAGE BUSINESS ORDINARY RATES**





#### **AVERAGE FARMLAND ORDINARY RATES**








## HOW WE COMPARE TO OUR NEIGHBOURS




